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




Learning Never Stops

New graduate and professional programs expand knowledge beyond graduation

In the past year, Loras has introduced four continuing education programs that offer additional opportunities for graduates and professionals either in their fields or in a profession they wish to pursue. You can learn more and apply by visiting loras.edu/graduate.



Certified Financial Planning Certification

Loras launched a collaboration with Dalton Education to offer a certified financial planning (CFP) certification education that fulfills the education requirements necessary to sit for the CFP exam. In this nine-month virtual program, students learn from nationally-recognized experts in their fields and in strategies for successful completion of the CFP exam.

The program offers a flexible yet structured learning path, providing students with practical,

applied knowledge and is open to anyone interested in attaining CFP certification. It is well-suited for new financial professionals looking to build a solid career foundation, mid-career professionals looking to advance in their current position, career changers looking to enter the financial planning profession, financial advisors looking to enhance their earning potential and professionals committed to maximizing client satisfaction.

Master of Science in Biomedical Sciences

When the current academic year started, the new biomedical sciences program launched to serve as an academic record enhancement postbaccalaureate pre-medical/pre-health program. These types of postbaccalaureate programs are specifically intended for students who have taken the required undergraduate science coursework to apply to medical school or other graduate-level health professional programs but do not have a competitive application. The program's coursework is designed to challenge students looking to enhance their previous academic history to be competitive applicants for med school, a Ph.D. program or a full-time job.

Athletic Training Continuing Education

The latest program to launch is a continuing education opportunity for athletic trainers. Offered quarterly, it will address practice gaps from Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE) 2020 standards to clinical practice for certified athletic trainers and athletic training students in the tri-state region. The courses will focus on various topics pertinent to athletic training including injury and illness prevention and wellness promotion; examination, assessment, and diagnosis; immediate and emergency care; therapeutic intervention; and healthcare administration and professional responsibility.

Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor Certification Education Program

With rates of alcohol and drug addiction rising dramatically, the need for additional counselors led to the creation of a program that fulfills the educational requirements needed to apply to become an Iowa Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC).

The four courses in the CADC certification education program are offered in either an in-person evening, online or hybrid format to allow individuals to continue to work or gain the required internship hours needed to apply for the certification.

LASTING LEGACY

With his recent passing, the impact that **Mike Valder** ('62) had on Loras College can be measured by the students who have had their lives changed through his commitment to their success. A member of the board of regents and long-time champion of Loras students, Valder leaves a lasting impact on his alma mater.

"Mike loved Loras. He was an outspoken advocate for students on the margins," President **Jim Collins** ('84) said. "He funded our Valder Scholar Summer Internship program and was so excited about our efforts to grow our Hispanic student enrollment."

In honor of his brother **Robert Valder** ('60), a civil rights organizer in the South, Mike and his wife, Janet, established the Robert Valder Social Justice Scholarship program at Loras. While it started as an award in name and a financial contribution to a student's tuition, the scholarship transformed into an eight-to-ten week summer experience working at a social justice organization.

Mike and Janet also conceived of a new initiative, The Loras Giving Circle, for an annual fund for social justice internships and projects to create opportunities for members of the Loras community to engage in transformative experiences in the areas of peace, interfaith understanding, diversity, equity and inclusion.

"The Valders envisioned the fund being a way to expand social justice work on campus through creating a giving circle, enabling us to expand summer internships and new projects during the year," **Stacia (Edwards) McDermott** ('03), director of spiritual life, said. "I am thrilled with the possibility of continuing to guide students on how they can engage in social change in real and tangible ways."

The impact of the scholarship has been significant to many students since its inception in 1988. Every year, students have had transformative experiences made possible by Mike and Janet.

"We have lost a great, kind and generous man," **Nancy (Zachar) Fett** ('90), associate professor of social work, said. "I do believe his legacy will live on in the lives of people he has helped through all of his efforts. There are people who may not know his name, but their lives are better because he walked with us for a while. His example will continue to influence me for the rest of my journey."

The annual fund will increase available money for summer social justice award recipients and provide for additional funding, creating a Loras community that has access to transformative experiences that lead to systemic change on the Loras campus and in our nation and world.

In coordination with the Loras advancement team, members of the giving circle are constituents who provide annual gifts to this initiative of \$500 or more and alumni who were Valder Justice Scholars who give \$100 or more annually. Upon entry into the circle, donors will be provided periodic briefings and newsletters to update and describe funding proposals, with hopes of an annual event to come.


REFLECTIONS FROM A STUDENT

Loras welcomed five alumni to its board of regents on October 1. Their arrival also marked the end of the distinguished service of seven retiring board members.





MORE INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS FINDING A NEW HOME AT LORAS

The campus is seeing its largest influx of new international students in more than ten years as 14 students from eight different countries are among the latest flock of Duhawks. Additionally, more than 20 are scheduled to arrive for the spring semester.

Eleven of the current students are first-year students, with the remaining three transferring from other schools. They proudly represent their home countries of Colombia, England, Ethiopia, Greece, Guatemala, Liberia, Nepal and Spain.

Return to Normal(ish)

For first-year and transfer students, navigating a new campus and meeting fellow students can be challenging in the best of times. When it happens in the middle of a pandemic, things become even more difficult. For the 2020-21 academic year, those students had a unique experience unlike their fellow students. This year, they are finally getting something closer to the normal Loras experience.

While not operating exactly the same as the pre-COVID days, this semester operates on a new kind of normal that the campus hasn't seen before. Due to the high rates of community transmission in Dubuque County, Loras College has a face-covering requirement in place for all indoor campus facilities, including classrooms.

"I have felt more sense of community and enthusiasm about being together this semester – a feeling I am sure most people establish their first year," **Gabriel Sanchez** ('22) said. "It is very clear that people are antsy about being together again, and I am excited to finally be in person with my fellow Duhawks."

The COVID-19 pandemic forced Loras to transition strictly to online learning in March 2020. Last year, the College introduced a hybrid approach with both in-person and online instruction, but with heavy restrictions on gathering and spacing. As a result, much of the interactions across campus were online.

Along with positive changes in the atmosphere, there are also changes in the classroom.

"It is easier for me to focus in class with the professor right in front of me, holding me accountable. And I feel more comfortable asking questions in person rather than via zoom,"

Ella Reily ('24) said.

There are many perks with being in-person but this is still a transitioning time. Campus events, like homecoming, are back, as are many of the experiential learning opportunities that demonstrate how Duhawks help Duhawks.

"It is weird because I feel at home at Loras, but I am experiencing so many elements of 'Loras life' for the first time," Sanchez said.

As the semester continues, students are excited to get back to the things that make the Duhawk experience. After the last three semesters, students have a new appreciation to be back in person with the Duhawk community.

The Zoom fatigue, excessive screen time and connection issues that students dealt with last year are being filled with engaging in-person teaching, hands-on experience and one-on-one connections with the faculty.

This is the Loras many alumni and upperclassmen remember.



Historic Honors

SEVEN DUHAWKS NAMED CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN

Seven student-athletes were named College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans for the 2020-21 athletic year, a program record that surpassed six honorees in 2017. Wrestlers **Shane Liegel** ('23) and **Zeke Smith** ('22) became the first honorees for the wrestling program, and women's track and field student-athletes **Elayna Bahl** ('22), **Marion Edwards** ('22) and **Stevie Lambe** ('22) marked the first time the track and field program collected three honorees. Men's track and field student-athlete and 800-meter national champion **Mike Jasa** ('22) earned the honor as well as women's soccer's senior **Brynn Jacobi** ('21).

The CoSIDA Academic All-America program is the longest-running and most prestigious academic and athletic award for student-athletes. Student-athletes must be in sophomore or higher standing, hold a 3.30 GPA or higher and be voted as a CoSIDA Academic All-District selection to be eligible for the award. From there, the nation's sports information directors vote for the All-America team.

The Duhawks had 11 All-District honorees for 2020-21, including **Audrey Hinz** ('20), the first women's tennis honoree. Baseball student-athlete and American Rivers

Conference (A-R-C) Position Player of the Year **Luke Fennelly** ('22) was the program's first All-District award winner since 2017, as well as the men's basketball program's career three-point leader **Rowan McGowen** ('21), who added the program's second All-District award.

All-District nods also went to Women's track and field 10,000-meter national runner-up **Kassie Rosenbum** ('22), women's soccer's **Payton McDonnell** ('23), the NCAA Division III leader in assists in 2020, and men's soccer student-athletes **Juan Jose Arias** ('22) and **Kyler Donovan** ('22).

Congratulations, women's track and field team who claimed the 2021 NCAA DIII Outdoor National Championship – the second consecutive national title!

The reigning champions set school records in the 4x100m relay and 400m as they earned eight All-American honors and were named the United States Track and Field Cross Country Coaches Association Division III Scholar Team of the Year. Head Coach **Matt Jones** ('05) earned both regional and national coach of the year honors.

Not to be outdone, **Mike Jasa** ('23) won an individual national championship in 800m with a school record 1:50.00.


2021 NWCA DIVISION III

Following up on what was a historic yet shortened 2020 season, the Loras College wrestling team completed the 2021 season on a historical note at the 2021 NWCA Division III Wrestling Championship, earning a program-record nine All-Americans as well as crowning two national champions in **Shane Liegel** ('23) at 184 lbs. and **Wyatt Wriedt** ('23) at 285 lbs.

Liegel became the first Duhawk champion since **James Buss** ('14) in 2014 when he was crowned the 184-pound champion. Liegel cruised through the semifinals by collecting a fall, technical fall and decision to face off against familiar foe, sixth-seeded Ira Kuehn of Luther. After being tied at two points apiece in the third period, Liegel sunk in a deep armbar to pin Kuehn at the 5:35 mark. In the finals, Liegel toed the line against top-seeded Paul Detwiler of USCGA and proved the seeding committee wrong by churning out a decision to bring the Duhawk faithful to their feet as he became a national champion.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

In the tournament's final match, sixth-seeded Wriedt had his run in the 285-pound weight class, culminating in a national title. Wriedt started his journey with two decisions to reach the quarterfinals. Going against conference foe and third-seeded Kaleb Reeves of Coe College, Wriedt avenged a previous loss in 2021 to reach the semifinals. A decision victory over second seed Dominick Wilson of Olivet College meant a matchup with eighth-seeded Tyler Kim of Augsburg in the finals. In a back-and-forth affair, Wriedt used a late takedown against Kim to become the second national champion of 2021, marking the first time the Duhawks have had two national champions in the same year.

Liegel and Wriedt both earned All-America status as well as **Jared Hensley** ('22), **Jalen Schropp** ('24), **Zach Thompson** ('22), **Zeke Smith** ('22), **Daniel Ruiz** ('22), **Gabe Fiser** ('23) and **Jacob Krakow** ('22).

Making the Right Call

When he calls, **John Mulcrone** ('22) hopes you will answer the phone.

"I am really excited to connect with Duhawks to hear their stories and share with them all of the exciting ways to support the College," said Mulcrone, an English literature major who is working as an intern this semester for the annual giving campaign in the Bob Holtz Advancement Office.

When he connects with people by phone, Mulcrone tells them how much their support for Loras impacts students. Alumni who give to the Loras Fund are helping address nearly every need on campus. More importantly, they are helping make an education rooted in

Catholic Social Teaching affordable and accessible to current and future students.

"I wasn't sure where I wanted to go to college," Mulcrone said, even though his parents – **Thomas** ('93) and **Molly (Siepman) Mulcrone** ('95) – are both Duhawks. "I attended the scholarship day competition at Loras and received one of three full-tuition scholarships. That made it possible for me to come to Loras and made it the best option for me."

To be awarded the scholarship, he went through an interview process and wrote an essay about a community that had made him feel at home. "I wrote about my high school, St. Patrick's, and the impact it had on me growing up," Mulcrone said. St. Patrick's is one of the boys' high schools on Chicago's northwest side.

His growth has continued at Loras. "I've learned a lot about myself," Mulcrone said. "Loras is definitely a place where I've grown to be comfortable. I've made a lot of great friends from different places, many even new to me. The faculty, especially my professors in the English department, have been nothing but incredibly nice and helpful."

Away from his studies, Mulcrone has been active in intramurals, worked on the staff of The Lorian and published an essay in The Limestone Review. In addition to the Advancement Office, he has worked as a basketball referee at the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Dubuque.

What has stood out to Mulcrone is the passion everyone has for Loras.

"When I talk to them on the phone, many tell stories about their time at Loras," he said. "It is really fun to talk with them and hear about their Loras experiences, like mine."
